FARM BILL TRAINING

Two employees of the FSA Office will be attending Farm Bill Training the week of September 16 – 19, Monday through Thursday and will be away from the office for that week. That will leave one employee to answer phones and handle the counter traffic. We ask that please be mindful when visiting or calling the office of this fact. If whatever you may be needing, we ask that if it can wait until the next week when we are fully staffed once again, please The FSA Office will be do so. All Colorado FSA Offices will have employees attending this training, therefore all offices will be short staffed during that week.

#### 2018 PLC rates

This past week, the 2018 PLC final payment rates were issued for wheat, barley and oats. Below is a table showing the details for each commodity (Kiowa County only). Payments will be issued in October 2019 to eligible producers on 2018 approved ARCPLC contracts that chose Price Loss Cover-

age (PLC) for the commodity on the farm.

Below is a comparison chart between 2018 and 2019 PLC payment rates. Be reminded producers have not completed a program election and have not completed an enrollment contract for 2019. As you can see with the lower commodity prices for 2019 crops, the PLC rates are projected higher than the 2018 rates. Be reminded, 'P' after the rate represents projected and the 'F' represents final rate.

#### 2019 and 2020 ARCPLC Election

In the 2014 Farm Bill if the producers did not make an election on a farm with covered commodity base acres: the farm was defaulted into the Price Loss Coverage program (PLC). In the 2018 Farm Bill that portion of the election process has been removed. Read below for the porting. new rule.

or PLC on a crop-by-crop basis; or ARC-IC for all covered commodity base acres on a farm. This election will apply to the farm for 2019 through 2023. Program election changes are permitted in crop years 2021, 2022 and 2023. Failure to make a valid election in 2019 will result in a continuation of the program elected for 2014 through 2018 crop years for all covered commodities with base acres on the farm: and 2019 payments for those unelected covered commodities will not be issued.

Again, the 2019 and 2020 election process in Kiowa County will begin in October. At this time, the plan is for producers to call the office and make an appointment and complete the election process and complete the enrollment for 2019 and 2020 and 2020 acreage re-





## Colorado attorney generalasks appeals court to reconsider ruling in **TABÖR** lawsuit

attorney Colorado's general hopes a federal appeals court will reconsider its decision to hear a case challenging the state's Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR).

The 10th Ú.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in July reversed a U.S. District Court decision from 2017 that dismissed a lawsuit that argues TA-BOR, a constitutional amendment approved by voters in 1992, violates the U.S. Constitution by subverting representative government, since it requires taxpayer approval to raise or lower

Attorney General Phil Weiser Wednesday petitioned the appeals court to reconsider the ruling in the lawsuit, Kerr v. Po-

Weiser argued that the voters, and not a federal court, should decide the fate of the TABOR amendment.

"Until this ruling, the Courts have consistently ruled that federal courts are not the proper place for school boards, special districts and county commissions to resolve disagreements with their parent state over state policy," Weiser said in "Under statement. controlling law, political subdivisions do not have standing to use federal courts to challenge state policies - regardless of the merits of their complaints about the policy unless there is a specific federal law that gives them rights to do so.

"The political subdivision plaintiffs in Kerr v. Polis are not authorized to challenge TABOR in federal court," he added. Their concerns about the law are better addressed at the ballot box, not the federal courtroom.'

Weiser also said the appeals court's opinion conflicts with its past rulings and rulings by the U.S. Supreme Court.

"A rehearing of the full court is necessary to secure and maintain uniformity of the Court's decisions," Weiser said.

Voters will <u>decide</u> in November if state government should be allowed to keep TA-BOR-granted tax refunds in order to fund transportation and education.

Dear Dietitian. My teenage daugh-



ter was recently diagnosed with iron-deficiency anemia. She follows a vegan diet and has been taking a vegan supplement. Are these as good as regular iron pills?

Mom Dear Mom.

It is not uncommon for women of childbearing age to become iron deficient, especially if they have heavy menstrual periods. According to the US Department of Health and Human Services, iron deficiency is the most common nutritional deficiency and the leading cause of anemia in the United States. (1) The RDA is 15 mg per day for women 14-18 years of age, 18 mg for women 19-50 years old, and 8 mg for men 19 years and older.

Iron is needed for the production of red blood cells, which carry oxy-

gen to our organs and amino acid chelate, or in the form of murraya plement from a trusted tissues. Breakfast cereals, as well as flour and bread are fortified with iron. It is estimated that our bodies absorb heme iron two to three times more efficiently non-heme. The amount of iron absorption is dependent on how much the body needs, and vitamin C aids in this process. If excessive amounts of iron are consumed, it will be excreted in the feces.

Most iron supplements are made in a laboratory and consist of an iron salt, such as iron gluconate or iron sulfate. However, there are various types of supplements, including vegan, to fit your lifestyle. Remember, supplements are not regulated by the FDA, so know what you are buying. The label should list what type of

**Directions** 

Boil 5 sweet potatoes in water until they are almost tender.

After the sweet potatoes cool, peel and slice them.

Peel the apples. Remove the cores, and slice the apples.

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees.

Grease the casserole dish with butter or margarine.

Put a layer of sweet potatoes on the bottom of the dish.

Add a layer of apple slices.

Add some sugar, salt, and tiny pieces of margarine to the apple lay-

Repeat steps 6, 7, and 8 to make Layer sweet potatoes and apples to more layers of sweet potatoes, ap-

> On the top layer of apples, sprinkle the rest of the brown sugar and margarine pieces.

> Sprinkle the top layer with nutmeg.

Mix the hot water and honey together. Pour the mix over the top layer.

Bake for about 30 minutes until apples are tender.
